These guidelines specifically apply to the level of sedation corresponding to moderate sedation/analgesia (previously called conscious sedation), which is defined as a drug-induced depression of consciousness during which patients respond purposefully † to verbal commands, either alone or accompanied by light tactile stimulation. No interventions are required to maintain a patent airway when ...

2.1 The aims of procedural sedation and/or analgesia are to enhance patient comfort whilst facilitating completion of the planned procedure. In order to achieve these aims, a range of sedation options may be required during any one procedure, with a continuum from no medication, through conscious sedation and deep sedation, to general anaesthesia.

Moderate sedation, also sometimes referred to as conscious sedation, is a drug-induced depression of consciousness. A patient who has been sedated in this way is relaxed and generally insensitive to pain, but remains awake and able to respond to verbal instruction.

Conscious sedation for clinical procedures. Overview. Sedation of patients during diagnostic and therapeutic procedures is used to reduce fear and anxiety, to control pain, and to minimise excessive movement. The choice of sedative drug will depend upon the intended procedure; some procedures are safer and more successful under anaesthesia.
